
COMMUNITY IMPACT ASSESSMENT


The Welsh Government School Organisation Code (011/2018) requires local Authorities to undertake assessments of the impact on the Community and on the Welsh Language when proposing changes to the organisation of schools.

The Headteacher was invited to complete a questionnaire¹ for the purpose of assessing the current utilisation and community use of the school together with details of any activities involving the community to promote and strengthen the Welsh language.

Area profile

YSGOL LLANFIHANGEL Y CREUDDYN is in the village of Llanfihangel Y Creuddyn, which is the Ystwyth Ward with a population of 300 people. The 2021 Census data indicated the following age and language profile for the ward:





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

Current distance travelled by pupils

This is the distance traveled by the current cohort of pupils from their home addresses to Ysgol Llanfihangel y Creuddyn.



Safe Route to School and Community

Ysgol Llanilar is less than 5.5 miles from Ysgol Llanfihangel y Creuddyn, therefore the length of the additional journey is considered acceptable and well within the maximum 45 minutes travel time for primary pupils as noted in the Welsh Government's School Organisation Code.

Other facilities and services the school accommodates

In accordance with the School Organisation Code the following information was provided by the headteacher with regards community use and promotion of the Welsh language

Provide details of before-school and after school activities i.e., breakfast club, after school club:

There is a club before school held daily from 8 am onwards. This club is very popular and is being used frequently. It enables parents to drop their children off and go to work.

An Urdd Club is held after school every two weeks where children get the chance to socialise, play and communicate through the medium of Welsh. Preparing for the Urdd Eisteddfod is also a part of this.

A Sports Club is held during the summer term as well as Ray play sessions. These are very popular.

What additional facilities does the school provide e.g. youth clubs, play group?

Ti a Fi meets in the school when the rest of the school goes swimming.

Activities such as practices for the Urdd Eisteddfod are all through the medium of Welsh.

Provide details of use outside school hours and/or during school holidays:

As the Church owns the building, they use it regularly for coffee afternoons/ball races/bingo and many other different activities.

Cymdeithas Llanfihangel y Creuddyn (the local villages' society that was established by Dias Williams, former Headteacher) uses the school on weekends for fund raising events for charities.

The Community Council uses the school frequently for monthly meetings and the annual meeting is open for the community.

Is the school used for public meetings or events? If so, please provide details and frequency.

The school is frequently used for local annual/police/Senedd Members elections. During these times, the school will arrange educational trips for the children by ensuring that they don't miss out even when the site is closed for them.

Trawsgoed Community Council meets in the school monthly

The 'Gymdeithas' uses the school frequently for meeting to arrange events in the community.

What are the current local community facilities e.g. businesses, village hall, playground, holiday play schemes etc.?

There is no Community Hall, therefore the school is frequently used for community activities/events-a very important centre for activities for the village and the wider community.

Y Ffarmers - there is a strong relationship between the school and the local pub, Y Ffarmers. There was a scheme last year where the chef visited the school to cook with the children and visited Denmark Farm to teach the children where our food comes from (From Farm to Fork)

The school field is loaned to us and is used regularly for activities in the community such as the Summer Carnival and the 'Gymdeithas' Sports during the Summer holidays.

Common land adjoins the school across the river, and this is constantly used by the school and community hand in hand.

Are there any pre and after school activities which provide additional opportunity to use Welsh in the school e.g. the Urdd, Mentrau laith clubs;

The Urdd Club meets every two weeks in the school. Emphasis is placed on the importance of the Welsh language at the club and all pupils are encouraged to communicate in Welsh.

Urdd Sports Club (and officer comes to the school) learn new skills to the children-this is to promote the Welsh language by conducting fun activities where the children's enjoyment is visible. This is vital as it reinforces the ethos of the school by promoting the Welsh language and Welshness to give them a strong awareness of their community and their roots.

Does the school provide facilities for members of the community to learn Welsh, or undertake activities through the medium of Welsh?

Eisteddfod related activities are held where the community is invited to be a part of our Welsh celebrations.

The school promotes bilingualism within the village and the community e.g., on 'Shwmae, Sumae' day.

The school advertise events around the village, including in the Ffarmers.

Thanksgiving Service-the community is invited to join us in our annual service which is in the medium of Welsh.

The school's Facebook page advertise Welsh language lessons and basic vocabulary for parents to use with their children.

Any other information you would like to be included:

The school is an important Welsh hub for the village and the wider community. It is used by old and young people, and it is well supported on every occasion.

Due to this, the Welsh language seems to be used frequently by pupils in the wider community and many of those that come from non-Welsh speaking homes.

The school support the local paper, 'Y Ddolen' monthly, and this means that the wider community hears about all the schools' activities and achievements, all through the medium of Welsh.

The school is vital for this rural community by educating children about the local area, the importance of having roots within the local community so that they realise the worth of rural communities and its efficiency promoting Welshness.

The values of a rural school, though small, particularly in society for example the care between older and younger students, learn how important it is to work with others.

This provision through the medium of Welsh has served the are since 1838-the oldest educational institution in Ceredigion and has seen generations of families attend the school to this day which shows that roots are important to members of the community.

Every child leaves the school fluent in the Welsh language and happy and confident to use Welsh in the community.

A high percentage of students continue with their Secondary education through the medium of Welsh. Only 2 pupils have gone to Penglais school during the last 10 years-this reflects the positive impact Ysgol Llanfihangel y Creuddyn has had on pupils' and parents' choices and decisions.

Facilities that could be enhanced in the event of the school closure

The facilities could be developed for the community.

Facilities provided by the Ysgol Llanilar (alternative school)

Provide details of before-school and after school activities i.e., breakfast club, after school club:

The school offers a successful Breakfast Club which starts at 8.15am. The club is run by school staff and is a chance for the children to socialise, play and have breakfast before the school day starts.

An after school club called Clwb llar is held every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. The club is £7 and is open until 5.15pm.

What additional facilities does the school provide e.g. youth clubs, play group?

Every Monday Adran yr Urdd Bro llar is held where the children in the foundation phase play games, take part in sports and craft activities. This will lead to opportunities for learners to take part in sports competitions and the Urdd's Eisteddfod.

BMO Coaching offers fitness sessions after school for children from Reception to Year 2 every week.

Are there any pre and after school activities which provide additional opportunity to use Welsh in the school e.g. the Urdd, Mentrau laith clubs;

Every Monday Adran yr Urdd Bro llar is held where the children from the foundation phase play games and have fun through the medium of Welsh.

BMO Coaching offers fitness sessions in Welsh after school for children from Reception to Year 2 every week.

Does the school provide facilities for members of the community to learn Welsh, or undertake activities through the medium of Welsh?

The school plays a crucial part in the community. Llanilar Community Primary School won the Siarter laith Gold Prize and encourages our community to use and be proud of our Welshness which is an important part of this accreditation. Our Cewri Cymraeg have shared QR codes across businesses within the community with phrases to support and encourage people to start conversations in Welsh. We host events frequently during the year for families and the school community performs and participate in activities through the medium of Welsh.

Parents, carers and the community of the school are encouraged to learn Welsh by sharing course information online. These are shown on the noticeboards outside the school.

The school pupils frequently entertain the Llanilar Cylch Ti a Fi by singing Welsh songs. Llanilar Cylch Meithrin visits the school weekly to listen to stories in order to strengthen the relationship between the Cylch and the school. Additionally, members from the Women's Institute visit to read and chat with the learners weekly.

How parents' and pupils' engagement with the alternative school will be supported

Close engagement with the pupils, the parents and the community would be vitally important. It would be necessary to support the process of integrating the pupils in a sensitive and careful manner to ensure continuation and progression in their learning. The individual needs of the pupils would need to be considered to ensure an effective transition. It is acknowledged that there could be an impact on pupils' ability to participate in after school activities.

Impact on health and wellbeing

Pupils who currently walk to school can continue to walk to the designated pick-up point close in Llanfihangel y Creuddyn close to the existing location.

Impact on public transport provision

If the proposal was approved, it is not envisaged that it will have any implication on public transport provision.

Impact on wider community safety issues

It is not envisaged that there will be any impact on wider community safety.

If closure would encourage families to leave the community or discourage families from moving to the community

The information provided by the school details the current community events and facilities available for families with primary school age children. If the school was to close, it is possible that some families could potentially move from the area or for others to be discouraged from moving to the area.

Impact closure could have on other local services

The village does not have a community hall, the school therefore is used on a regular basis for community events – it is an important asset for the local and wider community.

What community activities would cease or be diminished by being required to move elsewhere

Details of the use of the school by the local community has been detailed above and it confirms a strong link with the local community and local church.

Whether the loss of the school will have a detrimental effect on the wider economy of the community

If the proposal is approved, the closure of the school may have a limited impact on the wider economy of the community.

Overall effect of closure on the local community

The information provided by the school with regards community use has been detailed above and whilst the school and grounds are used for community events, they are not the property of the LA and will remain in the village.

WELSH-LANGUAGE IMPACT ASSESSMENT

Language category of the school: Welsh Medium

Language category of the alternative school: Welsh Medium

All pupils in the Foundation Learning Phase experience areas of learning through the medium of Welsh. Welsh is the main teaching medium at Key Stage 2. English is introduced formally as a subject at Key Stage 2 and may occasionally be used for some aspects of other subjects.

Facilities for members of the community to learn Welsh and undertake activities through the medium of Welsh and where alterative facilities could be provided:

The school questionnaire states members of the community are invited to join in with school activities.

Appropriateness of providing additional after school facilities at the alternative school to secure standards in the Welsh language:

A questionnaire completed by Ysgol Llanilar stated:

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Parents, carers and the community of the school are encouraged to learn Welsh by sharing course information online. These are shown on the noticeboards outside the school.

The school pupils frequently entertain the Llanilar Cylch Ti a Fi by singing Welsh songs. Llanilar Cylch Meithrin visits the school weekly to listen to stories in order to strengthen the relationship between the Cylch and the school. Additionally, members from the Women's Institute visit to read and chat with the learners weekly.

Every Monday Adran yr Urdd Bro llar is held where the children from the foundation phase play games and have fun through the medium of Welsh.

BMO Coaching offers fitness sessions in Welsh after school for children from Reception to Year 2 every week.

How parents' and pupils' engagement with the alternative school and the specific language enhancement it offers could be supported:

Close engagement with the pupils, the parents and the community would be vitally important. It would be necessary to support the process of integrating the pupils in a sensitive and careful manner

in order to ensure continuation and progression in their learning. The individual needs of the pupils would need to be considered to ensure an effective transition. It is acknowledged that there could be an impact on pupils' ability to participate in after school activities.

Observations provided by the Local Authority's Welsh Medium education forum and Information on how the proposal fits with the Authority's Welsh in Education Strategic Plan:

The Welsh language forum meets termly to monitor the Welsh in Education Strategic Plan. The proposal does not impact on the recommendations within the WESP as both schools are existing Welsh medium schools.



WELSH LANGUAGE STRATEGIC PLAN

Ceredigion County Council's Welsh in Education Strategic Plan 2022-32 is clear in its aim and principle of developing our pupils' ability to use both Welsh and English fluently and confidently in a variety of situations. This will enable them to become full members of the bilingual society of which they are a part, fostering pride in the languages, heritage and culture of Ceredigion and Wales.

Ceredigion Education Authority seeks to ensure appropriate emphasis on the Welsh language and culture and strongly believes in the educational value of being able to communicate fluently in both Welsh and English as a benefit to all pupils. The Education Authority declares itself firmly in favour of developing pupils who are confidently bilingual in all of Ceredigion's primary and secondary schools.

The Ceredigion Schools' Language Strategy (2008) is key to the success of the bilingual provision and the Ceredigion Schools' Language Policy is a firm and unambiguous basis for the Welsh in Education Strategic Plan 2022-32, and the provision and implementation of practical targets will lead to progress in bilingualism at all levels.

Ceredigion Education Authority seeks to ensure that children and young people are offered rich, relevant and creative contexts (including ICT developments and Digital Competency), enabling them to extend and apply their language skills. Offering opportunities to enhance oral skills (specifically) at all stages of the educational journey is a core element in order to ensure fluent and confident speakers.

The Authority will also ensure that families are aware of, and have access to the support available, as their children and young people develop along the language pathway/continuum. The Authority will continue to focus on strengthening the Welsh language in its primary schools through investment and improvements to the provision, to create firm foundations for learning through the medium of Welsh and other languages in secondary school.

The Authority will work on a regional and cross regional level to share resources and expertise and encourage links between schools to improve the quality of language teaching and learning.

The Authority, through this strategy is contributing to its duty under the Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 to promote and safeguard the culture and heritage of Wales and the Welsh language. It contributes to the goal of 'a Wales of vibrant culture and thriving Welsh language.'

This scheme is intertwined with the Welsh Government Language Strategy of creating one million Welsh speakers by 2050. Ceredigion Education Authority agrees with the view that the education system is the main method of ensuring that children develop their Welsh language skills, and of creating new Welsh speakers.

aims to develop the use of the Welsh language in the County. In 2024, 4 Sub-committees were created to focus on each of the 4 strategic themes of the Language Strategy - Learn, Belong, Live and Succeed. The LEARN Sub-committee will focus on actions relating to Education, Skills and activities for children, young people and families. The BELONG Sub-committee will focus on actions relating to the Welsh language in the community and Welsh Culture.



EQUALITY IMPACT ASSESSMENT

The Equality Act 2010

The Equality Act 2010 (the Act) brings together and replaces the previous anti-discrimination laws with a single Act. It simplifies and strengthens the law, removes inconsistencies, and makes it easier for people to understand and comply with it. The majority of the Act came into force on the 1 October 2010.

The Act includes a new public sector equality duty (the 'general duty') replacing the separate duties on race, disability, and gender equality. This came into force on the 5 April 2011.

What is the general duty?

The aim of the general duty is to ensure that the public authorities and those carrying out a public function consider how they can positively contribute to a fairer society through advancing equality and good relations in their day-to day activities. The duty ensures that equality considerations are built into the design of policies and the delivery of the services and that they are kept under review. This will achieve better outcomes for all.

Under the legislation, public authorities have legal duties to pay 'due regard' to the need to eliminate discrimination and promote equality with regard to race, disability and gender, including gender reassignment, as well as to promote good race relations. The Equality Act 2010 introduces a new public sector duty which extends the coverage to age, sexual orientation, pregnancy and maternity, and religion or belief. The law requires that the duty to pay 'due regard' be demonstrated in the decision-making process. It is also important to note that the public authorities subject to the equality duties are also likely to be subject to the obligations under the Human Rights Act and is therefore wise also to consider the potential impact that decisions could have on human rights as part of the same process.

Socio-economic Duty

It would be necessary to support the process for all pupils including those from economically deprived backgrounds in a sensitive and careful manner in order to ensure continuation and progression in their learning process. All pupils in the primary sector are entitled to a free school meal.

THE WELL-BEING OF FUTURE GENERATIONS (WALES) ACT 2015

The Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 gives a legally-binding common purpose of seven Well-being Goals and five Ways of Working designed to support and deliver a public service that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs.

Long term



The importance of balancing short-term needs with the need to safeguard the ability to also meet long-term needs

Ensuring the long-term sustainability of education in Ceredigion and ensuring that there are sufficient school places to meet the needs both now and in the future.

Prevention



How acting to prevent problems occurring or getting worse may help public bodies meet their objective The annual review of school places to include pupil projections and financial resilience is undertaken in line with the objectives of the Corporate Strategy.

Integration



Considering how the public body's well-being objectives may impact upon each of the well-being goals, on their other objectives, or on the objectives of other public bodies

Community integration is a focus of all schools creating an environment to support culture, heritage and the Welsh language.

Collaboration



Acting in collaboration with any other person (or different parts of the body itself) that could help the body to meet its wellbeing objectives

Increase collaboration between services and communities to ensure the continued delivery of education to all pupils.

Involvement



The importance of involving people with an interest in achieving the well-being goals, and ensuring that those people reflect the diversity of the area which the body serves

The statutory consultation process provides an opportunity for all stakeholders (to include pupils, staff, governors and the community), to respond to the proposal.
